

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
ABOUT ANCHOR OF HOPE

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

n the grand tapestry of biblical imagery, the Anchor stands as a symbol of stability, hope, and security. Yet, when we encounter the notion of an Anchor within the sacred precincts of the Holy of Holies, as hinted in Hebrews 6:19, the significance deepens, inviting us into a profound exploration of faith, redemption, and the sacred mystery of Christ's atonement.

Hebrews 6:19 reads, "We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, firm and secure. It enters the inner sanctuary behind the curtain." Here, the author of Hebrews paints a vivid picture, intertwining the metaphor of an anchor with the sanctity of the Holy of Holies. The Anchor, traditionally associated with ships and maritime settings, now finds its place within the most sacred space of the heavenly Tabernacle, the place where Christ our Lord and High Priest is ministering on our behalf.

To grasp the full significance of this imagery, we turn to the timeless hymn, "My Hope Is Built on Nothing Less." The hymn's refrain resounds with the confession: "On Christ, the solid Rock, I stand; all other ground is sinking sand." This proclamation echoes the sentiment of Hebrews 6:19, affirming Christ as the steadfast Anchor of our souls, grounding us in the unshakeable foundation of His blood and righteousness.

But why does the Anchor find its dwelling in the Holy of Holies? The answer lies in understanding the purpose of this sacred space within the Hebrew Tabernacle and later, the Temple. The Holy of Holies represented the dwelling place of God's presence among His people, a realm accessible only to the high priest and veiled from the ordinary worshipper. It was here, in the innermost chamber, that the Ark of the

Covenant rested—a tangible symbol of God's covenant relationship with Israel.


In the Old Testament, the high priest would enter the Holy of Holies once a year on the Day of Atonement, carrying the blood of sacrificial animals to make atonement for the sins of the people. This ritual foreshadowed the ultimate atonement to come through the perfect sacrifice of Jesus Christ, whose blood would cleanse humanity of sin once and for all and later His ministry as High Priest in heavenly sanctuary.

The Anchor's presence in the

Holy of Holies signifies the anchoring of our hope in the person and work of Christ, who entered into the heavenly Holy of Holies, not with the blood of goats and calves, but with His own blood, securing eternal redemption for all who believe (Hebrews 9:12).

As we reflect on the Anchor within the Holy of Holies, we are reminded that our hope is not anchored in fleeting temporal realities but in the eternal truths of God's unfailing love and faithfulness. Like ships navigating tumultuous waters, we cling to the Anchor of our souls, trusting in the promise of Christ's finished work on the cross and His ongoing intercession on our behalf which the Hebrews author says, "Seeing then that we have a great High Priest, that is passed into the heavens, Jesus the Son of God,... let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need."

In conclusion, the Anchor's presence in the Holy of Holies beckons us to anchor our faith securely in Christ, the solid Rock, who alone provides true stability and security in a world engulfed by uncertainty. May we, like the hymn writer, declare with unwavering confidence: "On Christ, the solid Rock, I stand; all other ground is sinking sand."



hen the world is gripped with insatiable appetite for wealth and riches, what should be our hope? What should be our anchor when social institutions are rife with dishonesty, fraud, and outright exploitation as a way of survival? When millions of Christians are seeking spiritualism and getting financial 'blessings' at the expense of a "thus saith the Lord," what must be our stand? Should we join them?

Should we too, normalize homosexuality and lesbianism, and bless same sex marriages in our churches? Should we join the ivory towers of 'intellectual' supremacy and the theories of evolution, and forget our old-time religion? Should we now join the rush for wealth? Should we join the jungle of survival of the fittest, and get wealth by hook and crook? And baptize it in our churches? Should we also bow down to spiritualism, and enjoy the 'blessings' that come with it, at the expense of the revealed will of God?

The dark cloud upon our world is no strange phenomenon. The Bible says:

"But know this, that in the last days perilous times will come: For men will be lovers of themselves, lovers of money, boasters, proud, blasphemers, disobedient to parents, unthankful, unholy, unloving, unforgiving, slanderers, without selfcontrol, brutal, despisers of good, traitors, headstrong, haughty, lovers of pleasure rather than lovers of God, having a form of godliness but denying its power' (2 Timothy 3:1 -5).

It also says that Satan will perform "great signs and wonders to deceive, if possible, even the elect (Matt. 24:24). Yet at this very time, God calls for a special people to arise. In the book of Isaiah He says, "For behold, the darkness shall cover the earth, And deep darkness the people; But the LORD will arise over you, And His glory will be seen upon you" (Isaiah 60:2). "Arise," He says, and "shine; For your light has come! And the glory of the Lord is risen upon you" (Isaiah 60:1). These are a people of the word. While the world tramples upon and forsakes God's word, theirs is a "thus saith the Lord." "To the law and to the testimony!", they proclaim, "If they do not speak according to this word, it is because there is no light in them" (Isaiah 8:20). At every one of Satan's moves they answer, like their Master, "It is written" (Matt. 4:4). Nothing in heaven or hell can move them. They can neither be bought nor sold. They are "as true to duty as the needle to the pole;" they "will stand for the right though the heavens fall" (Ellen G. White, Education, p. 57). And these are

Seventh-day Adventists.

We are a special movement. While the world forsakes the six literal day creation story and the Sabbath, we proclaim, "Fear God and give glory to Him, for the hour of His judgment has come; and worship Him who made heaven and earth, the sea and springs of water." "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy." "For in six days the LORD made the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that is in them" Revelation 14:7; Exodus 20:8,11). We believe in marriage as "a monogamous heterosexual relationship between one male and one female" (Church Manual, 20th Edition, p. 161). While we believe in hard work and in biblical stewardship, we also believe that we are not of this world; that "we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out," and that therefore we should "not love the world or the things in the world," but that we should "seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to" us (1 Tim. 6:7; 1 John 2:15; Matt. 6:33). "When they say to you," says Isaiah, "seek those who are mediums and wizards, who whisper and mutter,' should not a people seek their God? Should they seek the dead on behalf of the living?" (Isaiah 8:19). We believe that "the dead know nothing," and that

they do not "praise the Lord, Nor any who go down to silence" (Ecclesiastes 9:5; Psalm 115:17). Therefore, we do not speak to nor consult the dead.

It is important to remember therefore that we are not just any other movement. We are God's movement. God has specifically called us to bring the world back to His word. He has called us to light up the world with His testimony. So, we cannot sit still. We must all get involved. We must all run. And to enable this, the church has created many ministry opportunities for every age group. Are you concerned about incest and child abuse? You are welcome to the Children Ministries. Are you concerned about gender and

transgender issues and how they may affect today's youth? You are welcome to the Seventh-day Adventist Church youth movement. Does your heart burn with fire as you watch the Christian church forsake the bible? As you see Bishops and Pastors marry woman to woman and man to man? Are you passionate about the biblical truth? And you feel like personally proclaiming it? You are welcome to the Personal Ministries department. Do you love the poor and vulnerable in society? Does your heart burn with passion as you watch our reckless world abuse them? Welcome to our Community service wings of Dorcas and the Adventist Men organizations. Are you concerned about how our

secular education systems are mis-educating the masses with the theories of evolution? Such as the Big Bang Theory? Welcome to our Education department. Our schools labour to debunk these theories. Are you 'angry' at our society as it creates unbiblical stories about albinos and other differently abled persons? Stories that end up in ritual killings? Are you passionate about the disabled? Or are you disabled yourself? You are welcome to the Adventist Possibility Ministries. In totality, the Seventh-day Adventist church is structured to "prophesy again" (Revelation 10:11), to the world. can fight our fears and bring glory to God.

We read that when Esther learnt of the plans to annihilate all the Jews in the provinces, and was implored to approach the king to stop it; Esther was afraid for her own life. No one was to approach the king, without being first called before him. Esther tried to avoid taking any action, but Mordecai again pleaded with Queen Esther to do something to save the Jewish people. Finally, Esther remembered on whom her hope was anchored. By faith, she instructed all the Jews to join her in prayer and fasting for three days and three nights. At the end of those three days, she would then approach the king with her request. Praise be to God; her request was granted by the King at the end of the days of prayer and fasting. When we

have God as our anchor, the storms of life will not assail us.

From the story of Esther, we also see that God places mentors in our lives to give us wisdom. He provided Mordecai as a mentor for Esther. Mordecai raised Esther to be God fearing and obedient. HE anchor holds the ship at the dock of the river, lake, or ocean shore. No matter how the wind blows at the shore, the ship is safe and secure from being taken and blown away. Though the tempest rages, the vehement storm courageously and rapaciously hammers and the ship is moved to and fro but within the docking range. The ship's owner is not even an inch moved knowing the strength of the anchor to which the ship is tied. The storms of life are real and Jesus is an urgent need in times of pain, mourning, divorce, loss of employment, and pandemics that hold the world with so many restrictions and untimely conditions, that are sometimes biased to certain conditions that would claim innocent lives. That moment when the ship is left alone and not holding to the anchor and the storm boisterously bits, the ship is gone without help.

Life presents itself with various opportunities that could turn someone's life fortunately to positivity and unfortunately ruins. The rope that holds to the anchor must always be very strong and ever in excellent condition. Never at any time should the rope be weak otherwise it's declared redundant and useless. Jesus said in John 15:5, "I am the vine and you are the branches, and without me, you can do nothing". The ship without the anchor is in great danger. It always depends on the anchor. In like manner our lives without Jesus our anchor, are nothing, we cannot hold, we can't bear any fruit, and we cannot achieve our strategic plans, our dreams, and our goals in life. Our safety is only in Jesus our anchor, ministry without Jesus the anchor is powerless, fruitless and less impactful. Without Jesus, we can do nothing. All our ministries, Youth, Music, Education, Children Publishing, Sabbath School, Chaplaincy, Religious liberty, Evangelism, prayer, preaching, must be fixed on our Chief Anchor Jesus Christ to prosper.

When life's storms trouble, drain, and seems to cast you into the sea, a prison of unhealthy, and financial quagmires, as long as you keep holding on to the anchor of Life who is Jesus Christ, you will soon have meaning in life. No situation is permanent, just like the storm is never always on the sea, it comes sometimes, so in our

lives, we shall face storms of life but keep holding on to the anchor of life. You may be unemployed, unmarried, divorced, widowed, orphaned, or in a



desperate situation right now, but know that the anchor holds the ship and no matter what the magnitude of the boisterous wind, the ship is going nowhere, it's anchored on the shore and the rope is extremely strong that the ship.

Out of heartbroken with pain in 1992, pastor Lawrence Chewnin wrote and performed a song after a devastating run of events in his family, an accumulation of misfortunes, he lost his father, lost a little boy child, a third miscarriage, as a family, they went through depression and took a sabbatical for six months to just reflect on God. He took a piano in his hands and what came to his mind was that just "the anchor holds". He resigned as a pastor, broken down with painstaking life moments, he said God, where are you when I am your pastor and going through such brokenness? He finally came to the conclusion that The Anchor holds through this song:

"I have journeyed through the long dark night: Out on the open sea by faith alone sight unknown and yet his eyes were watching me. The anchor holds

Though the ship is battered The anchor holds Though the sails are torn I have fallen on my knees As I faced the raging seas The anchor holds

In spite of the storm; I've had visions, I've had dreams; I've even held them in my hand But I never knew; They would slip right through; Like they were only grains of sand: I have been young; But I am older now

And there has been beauty; These eyes have seen; But it was in the night; Through the storms of my life

The anchor holds though the ship is tossed about. The hope is firm on the anchor. Our hope in all our programming, events, camps, rallies, camp meetings, music conventions, community services, administrative committees, executive meetings, church board and business meetings should all be anchored on Jesus Christ. I am meant to believe that all human beings regardless of career, business, calling and religious affiliation face struggles, unfortunate circumstances, pain, sickness, mourning, and death moments in our families. In spite of all these situations, Jesus our anchor holds us by his hand, to pull us through to new hopes, opportunities, success and prosperity.

In the words of Ellen G. White, "Above all else, the word of God sets forth the plan of salvation: shows how sinful man may be reconciled to God, lays down the great principles of truth and duty which should govern our lives, promises us divine aid in their observance. It reaches beyond the brief and troubled history of our race. It opens to our view the long vista of eternal ages, ages darkened by sin, undimmed by sorrow. It teaches us how we may share the habitations of the blessed, and bids us anchor our hopes and fix our affection there (EGW 1923, FE 542.4).

In our pursuit of wisdom and knowledge, in research for solutions to parotic and lifethreatening situations, Christians need to depend upon Christ as the anchor of wisdom and knowledge.

Ellen White states that "God has permitted a flood of light to be poured upon the world, in both science and art; but when professed scientific men treat upon these subjects from a merely human point of view, they will assuredly come to wrong conclusions. It may be innocent to speculate beyond what God's word has revealed if our theories do not contradict facts found in the scripture; but those who leave the word of God, and seek to account for his created works upon scientific principles, are drifting, without chart or compass, upon an unknown ocean. The greatest minds, if not guided by the word of God in their research. become bewildered in their attempts to trace the relations of science and revelation. Because the creator and his works are so far beyond their comprehension that they are unable to explain them by natural laws, they regard Bible history as unreliable. Those who doubt the reliability of the records of the Old and New Testaments will be led to go a step further and doubt the existence of God; and then, having lost their anchor, they are left to beat about upon the rocks of infidelity" (EGW 1894, CE 193.2).

May God help us rely on Jesus in all the missionary endeavors so that we may behold Christ in that which we choose to behold, listen, see, eat, choice of associates, and places we choose to go to.

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

Where everyone is involved in mission and everyone is cared for

"The influence growing out of Sabbath school work should improve and enlarge the Church"

(COUNSELS ON SABBATH SCHOOL WORK, P. 9).

hile the foundation of Sabbath School will always be Bible study and prayer, the focus of Sabbath School is mission. And just as Sabbath School itself is not merely a preliminary to the worship service, the Sabbath School Mission Program is not an optional preliminary to Sabbath School Bible study class time. Indeed, the mission program is a vital component that helps make Sabbath School Alive

Whereas the Sabbath worship service is longer and includes a variety of elements, the Sabbath School mission program is much more succinct and focused exclusively on the work of soul-winning. Such a mission program will be inspiring and attractive even for the vouth of the

church

Do not imagine that you can arouse the interest of the young by going to the missionary meeting and preaching a long sermon. Plan ways whereby a live interest may be aroused. From week to week the young should bring in their reports, telling what they have tried to do for the Saviour, and what success has been theirs. If the missionary meeting were made occasion for bringing in such reports, it would not be dull, tedious, and uninteresting. It would be full of interest, and there would be no lack of attendance." (Gospel Workers, p. 210, 211; Christian Service, p. 212)

Each week, the mission program should highlight three essential elements of evangelism:

1) Global Mission Report: Their Work

The Seventh-day Adventist Church is a prophetic movement raised up in these last days to give the Three

Angels' Message "to every nation, tribe, tongue, and people" (Revelation 14:6). This worldwide evangelistic mandate should be reiterated every Sabbath in every local church. Even if we have not been called to a remote mission field, it is vital to support with our prayers and offerings the work of those who have.

2) Local Outreach Testimony: Our Work

For many, the term "missionary" has become synonymous with "foreign missionary." To keep fresh in the minds of our people that evangelism is local as well as global, the Sabbath School mission program should include testimonies of soul-winning work from the home territory of every local congregation.

3) Personal Ministries Training: My Work

"Let the missionary meeting be turned to account in teaching the people how to do missionary work" (Christian Service, p. 211). Like any good sermon, every mission program should close with a challenge for personal application. Having witnessed inspiring reports of soul-winning work around the world and close to home, the final element of the Sabbath School Mission Program is <u>training for personal ministry</u>.

Sample Sabbath School Mission Program (09:00 - 09:30)

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

Understanding the Dis and how to Prevent

holera is a diarrheal disease caused by a bacterium known as *Vibrio cholera*. Although many types of Vibrio cholera exist, the subtypes associated with epidemics/ pandemics are the sero-groups O1

and O139.1 The disease has been around for centuries, with cholera like symptoms described in Indian literature from as far back as the 5th Century B.C.² The first Cholera pandemic originated in the Ganges Delta, India, in 1817.3 There have been several pandemics since. Each year, the disease affects between 1.3 to 4 million people with anywhere between 21000 to 143000 deaths.4 In October 2023, the cholera outbreak was declared in Zambia and as at 26th January 2024, there have been 14, 900 cases with 560 lives lost.5

The bacteria enter the body though intake of contaminated water and food. Large epidemics usually arise from faecal contamination of water supply. Major risk factors for cholera are, unsafe drinking water, poor sanitation and inadequate hygiene, conditions common in urban slums.

> Once in the small intestine, the bacteria produces a toxic chemical (enterotoxin) that pools water and electro-

lytes out of the cells into the lumen of the intestines. This leads to massive accumulation of water and electrolytes resulting in severe watery

diarrhoea. If the fluids and electrolytes are not quickly replaced, dehydration and shock quickly ensue, and ultimately death. Symptoms include profuse watery

diarrhoea, vomiting, thirst, body cramps, restlessness and irritability. As the disease progresses, the patient becomes very weak, may go into a coma and die, all within hours.

Key preventive measures:

1) Wash hands with soap and safe

- Before, during and after food preparation
- Before and after eating food or feeding your children
- After use of the toilet
- After cleaning your child's bottom
- After caring for someone who is suffering from diarrhoea

2) Drink

Drink safe water: water that is boiled and/or chlorinated

3) Food

- Eat foods that are thoroughly cooked and are still hot
- Avoid raw foods and vegetables other than fruits that you have peeled yourself

4) Use a latrine or toilet 6

Remember: If you or any other family member or friend have diarrhoea, rush to the nearest health facility, regardless of the time, as cholera can kill within hours. Do not wait for daybreak if this happens in the night. The greatest number of deaths in the current epidemic have been in the community and not at the health facilities.

Let us all join in the global fight to END CHOLERA.
